Our Taft Speakers

Patricia O'Connor

Patricia W. O'Connor, Charles Phelps Taft Professor of Romance Languages, Emerita, has won various awards for research, is a Corresponding Member of the Royal Spanish Academy and in 1997 was named "Alumna of Achievement" by her alma mater, the University of Florida. A specialist in contemporary Spanish theater and founding editor of the journal *Estreno*, she has published –to date—sixteen books, has another in press and is the author of over a hundred articles.

A special interest involves play translation. Among the authors whose works she has published in English are: Antonio Buero Vallejo, Ana Diosdado, Carlos Muñiz, Paloma Pedrero, Carmen Resino, Antonio Gala, Miguel Mihura, Jaime Salom, Itziar Pascual, Juan Antonio Castro, Charo González and Beth Escudé.

Representative of her research interests are the following book titles: *Mito y realidad de una dramaturga española: María Martínez Sierra*; *Antonio Buero Vallejo en sus espejo; Plays of the New Democratic Spain*; *Dramaturgas españolas de hoy; Mujeres sobre mujeres, Dramaturgas españolas en los albores del siglo XX/One-Act Plays by Women about Women in the Early Years of the 21st Century*.

Pat O'Connor is also a regular on the tennis court, an occasional painter and enjoys playing piano.

Our Taft Speakers (*continued*)

Alain-Patrice Nganang

Currently teaching French and German studies at Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania, **Dr. Alain-Patrice Nganang** received his Licence and then his Maîtrise from the University of Youndé, the capital-city of Cameroon, where he majored in German studies. In 1993, he moved to Germany where he brilliantly pursued his doctorate in comparative literature at the Johan Wolfgang Goethe-University of Frankfurt/Main and received his degree with *magna cum laude*, in 1998. His fields were Theater and Film Studies, German Studies, Romance Studies, and New Literatures in English. He taught both French and German and became a lecturer at the University of Frankfurt and then at the Humboldt University in Berlin. In 2000, he crossed the Atlantic and joined the faculty at Shippensburg University.

Dr. Alain-Patrice Nganang is the author of four novels, two novellas, and a collection of poems. He has also published a comparative study of Wole Soyinka's and Bertold Brecht's interculturality, *Interkulturalität und Bearbeitung. Untersuchung zu Soyinka und Brecht* (1998) and over twenty articles on African, French and German literatures and cinema. His second novel, *Temps de chien* (Le Serpent à plumes: 2001), received the Prix Marguerite Yourcenar in 2001, and the Grand prix littéraire de l'Afrique noire in 2002. The English translation, *DogDays* is forthcoming at the University of Virginia Press. The German translation, *Hundezeiten*, came out in 2003. His two most recent novels are *La joie de vivre* (Le Serpent à plumes, 2003) and *L'invention du beau regard* (Gallimard, 2005). He has a collection of essays, *L'état d'esprit*, and a book of poetry, *Apologie du vandale*, in press. Dr. Nganang has given lectures in several universities in Germany and the United States.

Dr. Nganang's current research on African literature is oriented toward the aesthetic tradition of Nietzsche (*Die Geburt der Tragoedie*), Georg Lukacs (*Die Theorie des Romans*), Walter Benjamin (*Ursprung des deutschen Trauerspiels*) and Theodor Adorno (*Theorie der neuen Musik*). His comparatist training allows him to tie his reflections on colonialism and genocide in Africa to the German Holocaust studies. He is currently working on an aesthetic theory of the new African literature. The title of his Charles Phelps Taft keynote address at the Cincinnati Conference on Romance Languages is: "An Other Republic."
